- 1. **Call to Order**, Start recording. Roll call, determination of quorum, selection of voting and Alternate Parks and Environment Committee Members, Selection of Secretary for the meeting. NOTE: Per the ENC Bylaws, all Representatives and Alternate Representatives must be current on all required trainings in order to vote or make or second motions.
- 2. **Approval of Committee minutes**. Discussion and possible action to approve draft Parks and Environment Committee Minutes of the <u>August 3</u>, 2022 Meeting.
- 3. Report/Presentation from any Agencies/Organizations present:
- 4. **Public Comment on Non-Agenda Items** within the Committee's subject matter jurisdiction Public Comments on Non-Agenda Items is limited to TWO MINUTES (2) per speaker. Time may be adjusted at the Chair's discretion. Public calling in, please press *9 on your phone to raise your hand to speak. - 5. Old & New Business Action Items: Votes may be taken on all action items.
 - A. Discussion and possible action:
 - Wildlife Corridor Ordinance and related issues:- A code amendment to Sections 12.03, 12.04, 12.32, 13.21, 13.22, and 16.05 of the Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) to create a new "Wildlife District," or "WLD," Supplemental Use District and a zone change to apply the Wildlife District and its regulations to properties within the district. The proposed Wildlife Ordinance and related materials may be read by clicking: Wildlife Ordinance. In 2014 the ENC voted to support the project but at the time there were no details. The original motion the ENC voted on may be viewed here: Wildlife Ordinance Original City Motion. The motion passed by the ENC was: "Motion to support CF 14-0518, which instructs the Planning Department to prepare and present an ordinance to create a Wildlife Corridor in the eastern area of the Santa Monica Mountains (Hillside Ordinance zone). We recommend that this ordinance be applicable to all of the Santa Monica Mountains within the City of Los Angeles. Community Impact Statement to be filed and communication sent to Planning and Land Use Management." Now that the draft ordinance has been created, we are able to review and comment on the report. It should be noted that City Planning decided it was best to integrate the Ridgeline Ordinance development with the Wildlife Study, see CF 11-1441 and 11-1441-S1

regarding the Ridgeline, Baseline Mansionization and Baseline Hillside ordinances. The intent of those ordinances was that they be applied city-wide. **Discuss and draft motion for presentation to the ENC Board recommending a community Impact Statement (CIS) supporting, supporting in part, or against the Draft Wildlife Ordinance and related issues such as area of implementation and urgency.**

- 2. Mulholland Scenic Parkway Specific Plan Implementation Guidance (MSPSPIG): The MSPSPIG was a ruling unilaterally issued by Los Angeles Planning Director Bertoni, limiting the purview of the Mulholland Design Review Board. The ENC previously filed a CIS not only opposed to the MSPSPIG but requesting that it be rescinded. The request was summarily rejected by the Mayor's office. On August 12, 2022, a court order was granted ordering that the City rescind the MSPSPIG. Discuss and draft a motion recommending that the ENC Board refer to it's original CIS and further reconfirm that the MSPSPIG should be rescinded, that the court's ruling not be appealed, and that any developments approved as a result of adherence to the MSPSPIG be identified. To be filed to CF21-1286, City Planning Commission, office of the Mayor and office of the City Attorney.
- 3. Composting: The CA compost law is part of SB 1383, which was passed in 2016. The program will involve managing compostable material for residential and commercial waste, including grocery stores and restaurants. By the end of 2024, the law is expected to have taken effect in every municipality across California. What's happening here other than nothing? Shall we assign a task force to investigate and report back, maybe with a speaker, next month?
- 4. Ordinance 186294: Consider recommendation to the board to consider a CIS recommending that City Council amend the ordinance to expand application to areas with extreme fire potential that are not in Very High Fire Severity Hazard Zones (e.g. Sepulveda Basin and west side of Hansen Dam Area), and further institute an immediate "zero tolerance" policy for any encampments or noticed trespassing in such areas, subject to criminal trespassing sanctions and immediate removal of persons and any materials deposited in the area by appropriate outreach and sanitation personnel. Any action would reference the ordinance and CF 19-0050.
- **5. Sepulveda Basin Off-Leash Dog Park:** Discuss ongoing issues regarding lack of watering, use of reclaimed water, and other maintenance issues. What can ENC do to help?
- **6. LA River Bridge Painting:** The gentleman who paints over the graffiti and makes checkerboard patterns on the gunite riprap near the river is asking for assistance.
- **B. Discussion and possible action**: <u>CF 20-1205-S1</u>, motion introduced 12/08/2021, notes that: "The Bureau of Engineering is developing the Master Plan for the Sepulveda Basin, called the Sepulveda Basin Vision Plan Project (Project), and is slated to start work on the Feasibility/Conceptual Study Phase in early 2022. The Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy

has stated that the Project is eligible for a grant related to the Upper Los Angeles Rivers and Tributaries. In order to fund the Feasibility/Conceptual Phase of the Project, the Bureau of Engineering would like to apply for \$950,000 in grant funds from the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy" That grant has been approved by the SMMC on, and was **approved by the Los Angeles City council on 2/23/2022, final 3/11/22.** The ENC filed a Community Impact Statement on CF 20-1205 noting, among other things, that it supports a new master plan for the Sepulveda Basin on the condition that it includes provision for informing and consulting with community groups including the Encino and Lake Balboa Neighborhood Councils. We have refiled the same CIS under CF 20-1205-S1, but we should discuss filing a supplemental based of the fact that the Encino Neighborhood Council has not yet as of 9/3/2022 been informed of anything regarding what is clearly going on.

- C. Discussion and possible action: Council File 22-0002-S18, introduced 2/22/2022, waived out of committee, passed 3/4/2022. The City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its state legislative program support and/or sponsorship for legislation that would provide at least \$197 million in funding necessary to complete design and construction of the Valley LA Riverway before the 2028 Olympics; and be it also resolved, with the concurrence of the mayor, that by adoption of this resolution, the City of Los Angeles also includes in its state legislative program support and/or sponsorship for legislation that would provide at least \$15 million to complete feasibility, planning and design of ULART active transportation projects in disadvantaged communities in Los Angeles. See also CF 21-0535. Do we have an update on what is happening with this?
- D. Discussion and possible action: <u>Council File 22-0002-S9</u>: Introduced 2/2/2022, waived out of committee, adopted 2/9/2022 the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021-2022 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for the Sepulveda Basin Vision Plan and the approval of a state budget request for \$3,000,000 in one-time funding for expanding open access and recreational amenities within the Sepulveda Basin Vision Plan. Is Support for this plan in the State Budget?
- **E.** Discussion and possible motion regarding Proposition K: L.A. For Kids Program projects within the boundaries of the Encino NC proposed for partial funding during Fiscal Year 2022-23:
 - Construct new aquatic facility (swimming pool); location has been reported as being just east of the Department of Recreation and Parks Valley Regional Headquarters (the overflow parking area) - \$3,000,000 available. <u>See also CF 19-0205-S1 report dated</u> 3/3/2022
 - 2. Hjelte Field: construct new athletic fields, lighting and parking \$1,000,000
 - 3. Los Angeles Riverfront Park Phase III Design (Balboa to LA River Orange Line Crossing
 - 4. Sepulveda Basin Lake Balboa Park (Proposition K Project ID #R31) to include complete design and engineering of a new irrigation system for the entire 67-acre site, and complete construction to install new irrigation system for an area of up to 11 acres, based on a total Proposition K funding authority of \$2,506,534. Approved by L.A. for Kids Steering Committee on 1/27/22.

- **F.** Sepulveda Basin Controlled Burns Clearly these will not happen anytime soon. They were not allowed due to potential burrowing owl presence.
- **G.** LA County Parks Needs Assessment 2021 Regional and Rural Edition recommendations regarding the Sepulveda Basin and possibly other parks located with the ENC. Website
